Things to do

- Water sports and land activities. Please book at reception
- Game fishing is permitted from bank or boat; you must have an EA rod licence. Permits available from reception
- Play area at lakeside
- New cycle track at lakeside
- Café and gift shop at lakeside
- Equipment hire and tuition, please book at reception
- Circular walks go all round the lake

Wimbleball Lake Campsite Rules

- No open fires
- BBQs are permitted. Please keep them off the grass and tables and dispose of in the skips only when completely out
- Dogs to be kept on leads and out of the water at all times
- Noise levels to be kept down by 22:00 and we ask for complete quiet after 23:00 in order not to disturb others
- If driving on site, please keep to a walking pace
- Camper returning after 23:00 please park in car park and enter on foot
- We do not permit groups of tents on one pitch, a maximum of two, two man tents shall be allowed on one pitch at a time
- Please place all rubbish in the recycling/waste bins
- Swimming is not permitted in the lake
- Please supervise your own children at all times whilst on site

Please note we reserve the right to ask anyone who breaks the above conditions to leave the site with no refund of monies

Information about the Area

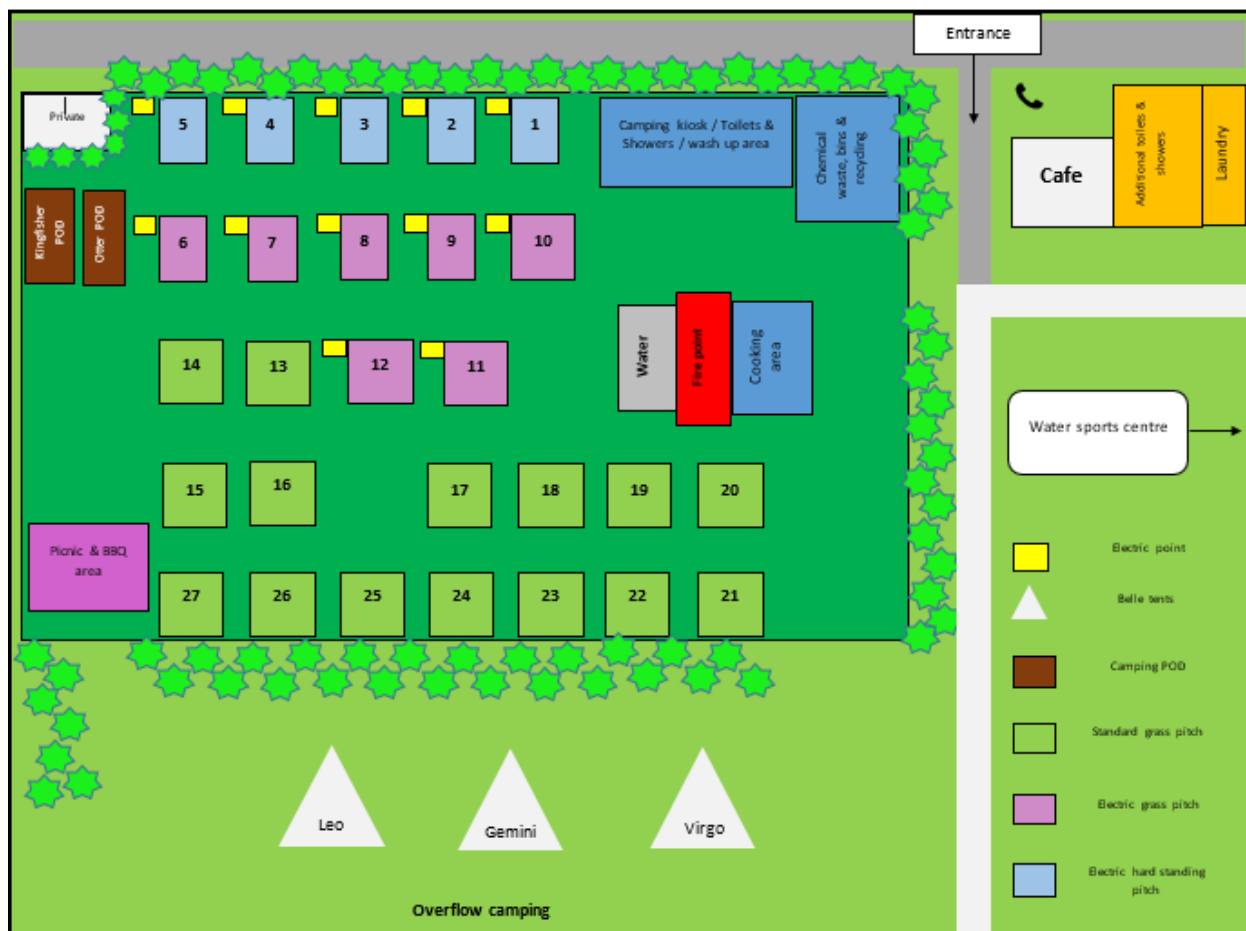
Exmoor National Park contains an amazing variety of landscapes within its 267 square miles. A unique landscape of moorland, woodland, valleys and farmland, shaped by people and nature over thousands of years. Exmoor national park has also been designated the first International Dark Sky Reserve in Europe.

Dulverton is roughly a 15 minute drive from the lake and is a busy little town acting as a service centre for southern Exmoor. It lies in an attractive setting where the deep and wooded Barle valley broadens into meadows before joining the Exe. A medieval bridge spans the river near the former workhouse, now the National Park Authority's offices. There is a National Park Centre adjoining the Heritage Centre, which has an art gallery and displays about Dulverton and the surrounding woodlands.

Bromton Regis is approx 2 miles away, and has a small volunteer run shop open Monday-Saturday 9:00-13:00 and The George pub which serves pub food.

The closest supermarket is a Tesco situated in Minehead, which is approx 40 minutes away. There is also a small co-op situated in Dulverton.
